From Tanzania to Gambia, Zimbabwe to Uganda, and beyond, these leaders are clear about what their countries urgently need:

- Economic opportunity
- Community mentorship and youth empowerment
- Leadership development
- Platforms for innovation, job creation, and financial independence

What they asked for is exactly what DIFFvelopment gives them: skills, re-education, community, opportunity, and a blueprint for generational wealth.

This Special Impact Report highlights the needs they expressed, the challenges they identified, and how DIFFvelopment is positioning them to solve them—locally and globally.

THE CALL FOR CHANGE: WHAT FACILITATORS SAY THEIR COUNTRIES NEED

Insights gathered from DIFFvelopment’s application form for prospective Country Facilitators show striking alignment across all 9 countries represented. Facilitators consistently cited unemployment, lack of opportunity, lack of entrepreneurial guidance, and inadequate re-education as the biggest barriers facing youth today.

TANZANIA

"I believe in empowering young people with both historical awareness and practical skills to build generational wealth." – Gloria Loishiye Moikan

Youth face unemployment and an inability to translate education into meaningful careers. DIFFvelopment's model of historical identity development + entrepreneurial training directly addresses the root causes she identified.

ZIMBABWE

"Young people are falling by the wayside due to family problems, financial constraints and unemployment."

– Jane Tendesayi Nyamandwe

With young people turning to drugs due to unemployment and instability, Jane emphasized the need for empowerment, purpose, and leadership development—core pillars of DIFFvelopment's mission.

CAMEROON

"Civil conflict [and unemployment necessitate] focused skills training programs and local business [collaboration] to generate job opportunities."

She highlighted disrupted education due to civil conflict and called for focused skills training, entrepreneurship mentorship, and job creation pathways—exactly what the BGWP provides.

ANGOLA

"Education, digital skills, and entrepreneurship [initiatives] can ... open pathways for innovation and self-reliance." – Vovi Maria Pedro Cololo

High unemployment and a lack of relevant training make DIFFvelopment's offerings essential in Angola's landscape.

GAMBIA

"[We need] financial support [and] innovative seminars for skill development and management." – Yunusa Mbaye

He emphasized the need for professional development seminars, public speaking, and business training—all embedded in DIFFvelopment's facilitator curriculum.

NAMIBIA

"Many young people lack access to mentorship, entrepreneurial skills, and opportunities that can help them turn their ideas into sustainable ventures."

– Justina Shivute

Namibian youth struggle to transition ideas into ventures. DIFFvelopment equips them with entrepreneurial tools, global networks, and leadership development.

UGANDA

"Unemployment leaves ... young people without opportunities to earn a living or support their families, [leading] to frustration, poverty, and a loss of hope for the future." – Morgan Buyinza

Morgan emphasized the importance of cultivating entrepreneurship and generational wealth-building mindsets—perfectly aligning with BGWP's core purpose.

KENYA

"Limited access to quality education and vocational training hinders [youth] competitiveness in the job market." – Abdalla Hassan Hussein

He emphasized unemployment, limited access to education, and social issues—challenges that DIFFvelopment addresses through mentorship and structured leadership frameworks.

ZAMBIA

"[Challenges include: the] lack of employment, lack of skills training centers and lack of recreational centers." – Christine Namukwasa

The DIFFvelopment curriculum—centered on wealth building, entrepreneurship, and community-centered leadership—directly advances these goals.

The facilitators told DIFFvelopment exactly what their countries needed: **skills, mentorship, opportunity, community, and a path to generational wealth.**
